Have you ever wondered how the Worship service gets put together?
Well I can tell you that it is truly a work of the people- both logistically and in heart.
There are so many who give of their time, talent and energy to create the worship environment and experience that we have on Sunday morning. (And there is always room for new faces so pay attention to how you might want to join in this collaborative work!)

<u>Did you know?</u> Our worship service touches a minimum of 10 sets of hands before Sunday morning's service.

Each season, liturgy is selected from Sundays and Seasons, a church resource that offers liturgy that follows the lectionary cycle (the 3-year order of rotational readings) and the seasons of the church.

Roger Halvorson and Kim Philips select our songs for Sunday and send them to Kim Croes.

I select the readings for each Sunday and send them to Kim Croes.

Rich Oelschlaeger prepares the Prayers of the Church.

Kim Croes takes all these pieces and puts them into the bulletin. Then she sends it off to Robin Black, Kim Philips, Roger and I to review and provide any edits or corrections. Kim makes any edits and once approved, she prints.

Each week, Robin Black, Beverly Koenen and Ruth Depuy serve as "Fluff and Folders" as they prepare the bulletins for Sunday with careful creases and strategically placed staples. Robin puts them in the Sanctuary for our ushers for Sunday morning.

Kim Croes uploads a PDF of the bulletin, announcements sheet, and children's bulletins to the website so that our online audience has access to these for worship.

Kim Philips handles the PowerPoint slides for Sunday morning. She selects seasonally appropriate graphics and translates all the spoken and sung pieces to the format that will appear on our screen in the Sanctuary and online to our live-stream audience.

Kim Philips then sends that off for review and edits to Robin, Kim Croes, and I. Once approved, Kim Philips sends it off to Brad Croes and Doug Holdhusen, the ones who make the live-stream happen and tend to the screen throughout the service.

<u>Did you know?</u> On Sunday morning, we generally have 5 staff participating in the service (myself, Roger, Kim P., Brad, and Kim C.). In addition to staff, there are at least 12 church members that provide leadership in the service (not counting folks that serve multiple roles in a morning). And that doesn't count when the Chancel Choir is singing, or we have additional musicians!

Think about it: Assisting Minister, Lector, Communion Assistants (3), Greeter (1-2), Coffee Cart, Altar Guild (2), Ushers (2-3), Sunday School (1-2), Healing Minister.

On my first few Sundays at Christ Lutheran, I was surprised by how many individual folks had to show up to make "church" go, to make worship happen. I was tempted to say, "Let's dial this back. Why have so many volunteers in one go?" But thankfully, I thought better of that. The more the merrier!

The phrase, "Many hands make light work," comes to mind. However, it's more than that. Each person who plays a role in Sunday morning is serving God. You are not just a placeholder or a spot filler, but you are gifted child of God, serving out of your gifts for the betterment of this beloved community. Now I'm certain many of you would brush that off saying, "It's no big deal" or "It's just what you do." But I want you to know that we are grateful for your service and for the ways that you impact this community, whether big or small. And we're grateful for our God who gathers, enlightens and sends us out to serve here and beyond!

<u>Did you know?</u> We have a Worship & Music Committee who tends to the worship life of this congregation. They meet once a month and are led and organized by Robin Black. This Committee is made up of the following folks: Robin, myself, Roger, Brad, Kim P., Chris Caldwell, Doug Holdhusen, Mike Maricle, Linda McGee, Marvin Moon, Stephanie Petrbok, Lonnie Timney, and Shannon Timney. We are grateful for the ways that they tend to the details, troubleshoot thoughtfully, and creatively dream about what worship can be.

From the desk of Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton

For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us (Ephesians 2:14).

Just a few weeks ago in my June column for *Living Lutheran* I wrote, "I can't think of an election cycle more fraught and divisive than this one. People all across the political spectrum claim that life as we know it is on the line. It's not possible to agree to disagree—one must decide and put a stake in the ground. There is the potential for violence." That potential is now a reality after last weekend's shooting at a Trump campaign rally that killed Corey D. Comperatore and injured other attendees. I am thankful that former President Trump's injury was minor and pray for his recovery alongside those affected.

I also wrote, "But division and violence don't have to be our inevitable future." I believe this and that God calls this church to say a definitive "no" to political violence now and in the future. Political violence has a long history but no place in democracy. This church belongs to God, and our unity in Christ is a grace-filled and healing gift in a fractured society. As the ELCA we have theological and community resources to meet this moment through worship, discipleship and civic engagement.

In the face of violence, God's resolve for peace in human communities is unshakable. In proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ's forgiveness, healing and new life, the church addresses the ultimate root of violence. God calls us as church together in this moment to hear and embody this good news by embracing our identity as peacemakers through active civic engagement grounded in our baptismal identity and our institutional witness to foster justice, racial and social equity, reconciliation, and healing with compassion and imagination.

Last weekend's shooting has distressed and destabilized our nation. Political violence breeds fear and can set in motion cycles of violence that will further shatter us. Consider how, as individuals and communities in our life together, you will:

- Confess and confront the violent tendencies within ourselves and our society.
- Resist use of dehumanizing language about people with different political leanings.
- Build bridges of curiosity and compassion with people who think differently.
- Find ways to cultivate the practices of nonviolence in civic life.

Our inevitable future belongs to God. In this certainty and bound together in Christian hope, consider how you can join me in ongoing prayer and actions for our nation, a peaceful election season, the safety of candidates for office, and a bold and life-giving witness of our church in the time ahead.
