"Then the Pharisees went and plotted to entrap him in what he said. ... Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar (the emperor) or not?" (Matthew 22:15-17). We know the answer. Jesus told them: "Give therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's" (vs. 21).

This passage has been used to inform the relationship between the institutions of the state and the community of faith. In this relationship the authority of the state is real and respected—but limited. God's authority is acknowledged as ultimate and deserving of ultimate devotion and obedience, yet it doesn't necessitate withdrawal from or opposition to participation in civic life and its responsibilities. We Lutherans call this the doctrine of two kingdoms, and we understand that the church and the state, the spiritual and the temporal, are both established by God and are both part of God's twofold rule. Both church and state are good gifts from God.

Lutherans have been accused of congenital quietism. Our understanding of God's twofold rule and even the story about paying taxes in Matthew have been used to discourage participation in civic life. However, active participation in public life has been part of the Lutheran movement from its beginning. Lutherans don't withdraw from public life. In fact, the ELCA's constitution pledges us to "work with civil authorities in areas of mutual endeavor, maintaining institutional separation of church and state in a relation of functional interaction."

...Dear church, our citizenship is ultimately in heaven. But we are also citizens of this country—this flawed, fractious, unequal, imperfect union. In U.S. political history, people have yearned and given their lives for what they had hoped for—democratic life for the sake of the flourishing of all. One of the ways we serve our neighbor is to participate in civic life. Can we see Election Day as a unifying event when the whole country goes to the polls? Vote.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) is currently reviewing a draft social statement on Civic Life and Faith. What is a social statement?

"Social statements are the ELCA's primary documents to address significant social issues.

They are intended to aid reflection, shape conscience and set forth the ELCA's teaching and policy on the major social issues and questions of contemporary life."

We currently have 13 social statements listed on the ELCA webpage on a variety of topics like Abortion, The Church and Criminal Justice, and Health & Health Care. (Fun Fact: Our Education Committee is hosting a 5-week study on our ELCA Social Statement on Peace in the months of November and December this year. Watch for the schedule soon!)

For the statement on Civic Life and Faith, the task force is currently receiving feedback on the draft statement in the hopes that an updated version will be considered for adoption at the 2025 Churchwide Assembly. The feedback period is open until September 30, 2024 so there's still time to add your two cents.

From the draft statement...

Article 16) The ELCA encourages individuals and worshipping communities to work together toward a civic life that better reflects God's vision for a more just and reconciled world. The various forms of advocacy offer ways to press civic leaders and public policy makers to respect the needs and dignity of all persons and our common home, with special concern for the vulnerable. Such faith-rooted advocacy is born from relationships of service and solidarity, is guided by ELCA social teaching, and requires different practices in different contexts.

In this election year, we want to encourage you as a person of faith to engage in public life. Let your faith inform and influence your decisions at the polls. Let your voice to be heard.


